Sons of Norway Bernt Balchen Lodge – President's Message

The Dissolution of the Union with Sweden (Unionsoppløsningen)

Most people of Norwegian descent know about the Syttende Mai (the Seventeenth of May), the day in 1814 when the Norwegian Constitution was signed and ratified at Eidsvoll by the Norwegian Constitutional Assembly. On the other hand most members of Sons of Norway pay little attention to another very significant date in Norwegian history – June 7, 1905. This is the date that the Norwegian Storting (parliament) declared Norway to be fully independent of its union under the Swedish king. Before this date Norway had not enjoyed separate status as an independent country for 525 years, since 1380 it had either been part of the Danish or Swedish kingdoms.



Though Sweden had eventually accepted the Norwegian Constitution and allowed Norway to form its own legislature, Norway was still under the thumb of the Swedish king at the turn of the twentieth century. And the Swedish king, King Oscar, had a big thumb and the authority to use it at will. Though Sweden was a constitutional monarchy the king retained substantial powers as head of state and there was still a strong Old-World conservative strain among many of Sweden's leading men. Without an aristocracy of its own, Norway by contrast, had fully embraced democracy and the concept of free trade by 1900. On the other hand, beyond being more conservative in outlook, Sweden favored a protectionist foreign trade policy. Norway, with its huge commercial fleet, felt restrained in its ability do business with the world by the restrictions imposed by the Swedish king and government. To assist its world-wide interest in foreign commerce, Norway was particularly insistent on having its own consular service. Sweden, alternatively, wanted to retain full control over the foreign affairs of Norway. This conflict over who should conduct the foreign affairs of Norway was the issue that pushed Norway toward full independence from Sweden.

After having their various proposals for a separate foreign service brusquely rejected by King Oscar, the Norwegian Storting on June 7, 1905 voted unanimously to dissolve the union with Sweden. In an early August plebiscite over 99.95 percent of Norwegian voters gave

their support to the dissolution initiated by the Storting. For a few months both nations mobilized their troops and war looked imminent. Finally, on October 26 1905, Sweden decided against a ruinous war and formally, though somewhat begrudgingly, recognized Norwegian independence.

Although many of Norway's leaders favored a republican form of government, the Storting wisely decided on a constitutional monarchy instead and they invited Prince Carl of Denmark to be the new king of Norway. After a referendum on November 12 and 13, nearly 80 percent of Norway's voters gave their support to a constitutional monarchy and on November 18 the Storting overwhelmingly elected Prince Carl as king of Norway. He accepted the same day and took the name Haakon VII in honor of King Haakon VI who had died as the last king of Norway in 1380. By going with a constitutional monarchy Norway had gained the support of the many other monarchies that dominated Europe at that time. Because Queen Maud, King Haakon's wife, was from the British royal family, Norway also won favor with its close trading partner Great Britain. King Haakon and Queen Maude were officially crowned as King and Queen of Norway in Trondheim at the Nidaros Cathedral on June 22, 1906. In the end, the peaceful settlement of their differences earned a lot of credit on the world stage for both Norway and Sweden.




KRONER WANTED

Rare Historic Commemorative Document from 1905

A Generous Donation from Kaare and Rae Elde

Two of our long term lodge members, Kaare and Rae Elde of Moose Pass, Alaska have generously donated a rare historic commemorative document from Norway's history (see accompanying photo). This large framed document shows all the members of the Storting (Norwegian parliament) along with Prime Minister Christian Michelsen

and his cabinet. This is the Storting that gained full independence for Norway by dissolving Norway's union with Sweden on June 7, 1905 (see President's message for a full historical background. These Storting members were Norway's heroes who bravely challenged the political might of Sweden and brought Norway full status as an independent country for the first time in over 500 years.

The document is not only historic, but beautiful, and is graced by prominent painted Norwegian flags at its top along with the great seal of Norway (see accompanying photo). The document has been in the Kaare Elde's family over 100 years and came with his relatives when they left Norway for South Dakota some 80 years ago. Kaare was entrusted with the document by his North Dakotan family members after he came to America in 1959. Five years later, it came with Kaare when he came to Alaska to begin his career as a marine pilot on the coast of Alaska. Both Kaare and his wife Rae formally donated it to Bernt Balchen Lodge on December 13, 2013. This



commemorative document will be prominently displayed in Viking Hall on the evening of May 17, 2014 as part of our Syttende Mai Celebration. After that it will be hung in the lodge with proper attribution to Kaare and Rae Elde for all to enjoy on a permanent basis.

Thank you again, Kaare and Rae Elde for your wonderful and thoughtful gift to the Sons of Norway Bernt Balchen Lodge.
