On the evening of March 10, 2015 with just about a week's prior notice Bernt Balchen Lodge was able to put on a wonderful welcoming reception for Ambassador Kåre R. Aas, Norway's Ambassador to the United States. Ambassador Aas came to Anchorage for a brief visit to give the keynote speech for the business conference Arctic Ambitions IV. Though he had but one night in Alaska he chose to spend it with the members of Sons of Norway. We are very grateful to him for choosing to spend his limited time with us. Because I was not properly using the microphone not everyone heard what I said when I introduced him and also gave a short biography. This piece shares some information about the Ambassador's visit that should be of interest for those did not hear what was said at Viking Hall and those that could not be there.

Kåre Aas has had a long and distinguished career in Norway's Royal Ministry of Foreign Affairs. This is a remarkable feat for someone was once just a young boy of working class origins who lived in the neighbor of Toyen in Oslo. He was initially targeted by school officials to go to vocational school, but he was able, in the end, to argue convincingly that he could handle a more rigorous academic track. He became a very successful student and in 1983 he joined the Royal Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Before taking the position of Ambassador to the United States in 2013, he served in many other important capacities. In 1995, he was made Deputy Director of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and then in 1996 he was assigned to serve as a minister in Norway's delegation to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. Later, in 2003 he was picked to head up the Ministry of Foreign Affairs' security division. In 2008 he was chosen to serve as Norway's ambassador to Afghanistan, a very challenging posting. From 2010 until he was appointed Ambassador to the United States he held the job of Political Director for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Ambassador Aas kindly gave us some remarks about Norway and its interest in the Arctic and spoke of the good relations enjoyed between Norway and the United States. He also informed us that His Majesty, King Harald of Norway, is scheduled to visit Anchorage in late May. We have put out an invitation through the Ambassador that we would love to host the King at Bernt Balchen Lodge, but we will not know if he will actually come to Viking Hall until sometime in early April.

As parting gifts we gave Ambassador Aas and Ms. Milbury wood carvings from the Fur Rondy's exhibit "Artistry in Wood". The Ambassador received a prize-winning wooden mammoth (our state fossil) brilliantly carved by Jon Iverson, a former member of our lodge who now lives in Soldotna. Ms. Milbury received a small but beautifully-made Alaska birch bowl turned by Kristine Chase, another Alaskan artist. Both loved their gifts.

During our time together I learned that the Ambassador and I shared some things in common. Like him, I had to escape being sent on a vocational track in school. Second, both of our mothers worked as cleaning maids in hotels. Third, we both entered government service, he in Norway and I in the United States. But that is where the similarity ends. He went on to high office and great accomplishments. And he will undoubtedly accomplish much more for Norway and the world before his career comes to an end. It was an honor and a privilege to meet and talk to him.

Both the Ambassador and Ms. Milbury did get to see a little of Alaska thanks to Eileen Johansen who took them to Glen Alps. On the way to Viking Hall I gave them a look at Cook Inlet from Point Woronzof. Hopefully, Ambassador Aas and Ms. Milbury will get a chance to see more of the "Great Land" in the company of the King when he comes in May.

The article in the Washington Post was about Urd's key role in the erection of an artistic artificial 32-foot Christmas tree at Union Station each year. This is annual gift from Norway to the people of Washington D.C.



The article in the Washington Post also told a truly Norwegian love story. Years ago Urd met a man on line who then lived in Idaho. After they got to know each other better through on-


