If you are interested in contemporary Norway, I have recently found a new way to connect to the old country. Use your internet browser to go to "<u>tv.nrk.no/programmer/utland/</u>" and you will be able to gain access to a

selection of programs from Norwegian public television. When "Her er oversikten - NRK TV - NRK.no" or "Programmer tilgjengelig i utlandet - NRK TV – NRK.no." pops up click the link and you will get a menu of television programs you can watch if your internet connection allows for streaming. With one exception these are older programs that have already been shown on Norwegian public television, but many are fun to watch and are informative. The exceptions are the news programs. The "Distrikt Nyheter" options give you an opportunity to watch the local news reports from the various traditional regions of Norway within a day of their original broadcast. These news programs are often given in the local dialect and it is a good way to practice your comprehension of the Norwegian language. Also, the selection of news stories gives you a sense of what is going on in Norway today.

This past month our lodge was approached by brothers Jerry and Roger Hansen wondering if the lodge would be interested in having a couple of their family's books on loan that they have inherited from their father. The books are volumes II and III of a collection of newspaper articles written during WWII and published in 1945-46 in Norway. The title of the two volumes is "Norsk Presse Under Hakekorset" which translates as "The Norwegian Press under the Swastika."

These are a fascinating look back at history showing us what was in the news during the war years in Norway. Even more interesting is that one of the volumes is a collection of the "official" press, that is to say the German controlled propaganda news, giving a lopsided view of what was happening where the Germans and their sympathizers were always the heroes.

The other volume is a collection of the "illegale aviser" or underground press, illegal news stories published in various forms by members of the Norwegian resistance movement. Many of these "newspapers" were not much more than handwritten pamphlets copied on home mimeographs and distributed carefully under risk of arrest, prison and torture for those that were caught disseminating anti-Nazi materials.

The Hansen brothers have generously made these two volumes available to our lodge members on loan to our library for a limited time. For those that are interested in taking a look back in time, please note that all of the articles are written in Norwegian, so if you are not fluent, you had best find a buddy who can assist with translation. If you are interested in viewing these books, please contact the office at Viking Hall to check on availability.
