Sons of Norway Bernt Balchen Lodge President's Message

Recently I have been reading about the history of Sons of Norway so as to fill in some of the big gaps in my knowledge about the origins and purpose of our fraternal order. One thing I found interesting was how Sons of Norway got its name. It was apparently inspired by a popular Norwegian nationalistic song from the early nineteenth century which begins "Sønner af Norge, det ældgamle Rige (Sons of Norway, that ancient realm [or kingdom])". This song was enthusiastically sung at the second meeting of the founders in 1895 right after they voted to adopt "Sons of Norway" (originally "Sønner af Norge") as the name of their brand new

Another interesting fact about the founding of Sons of Norway is the fact that the majority of its founding members were "Trønders", Norwegians borne in Trøndelag, the region that surrounds the town of Trondheim in north central

Norway. Trønders have a reputation among other Norwegians for their organizational skills and their love of order. So, it seems only fitting that the Trønders were the majority players in the successful founding of Sons of Norway in Minneapolis, Minnesota, some 118 years ago.

In its first decade of existence Sons of Norway flourished and dozens of new lodges formed across the nation, from Brooklyn to Seattle. This success was in part attributable to the organizational and recruiting talents of the original founders, but there was another important element that attracted Norwegians and people of Norwegian descent to the order and led to its early robust success. It sought out and honored the common man. Moreover, its leaders were selected from the pool of common folks in Sons of Norway, considered the "lodestones" of the order, not the "big shots". In 1905, a respected Lutheran pastor was asked why Sons of Norway had done so well over the past decade. He answered with double emphasis, "It is democratic! It is democratic!" What he meant is that each member had a vote and a say in the business of Sons of Norway no matter his social status outside the lodge. Sons of Norway leaders were chosen for their ability to serve, not their wealth or political power. Everyone shared an equal standing as members of their respective lodges.

This is still true today. As a member of Bernt Balchen Lodge you have an opportunity to make your voice heard and vote on important lodge matters. I invite you to exercise that right at our monthly Business Meetings on the second Thursday of each month. Join us in the ancient Norse tradition of democracy, a tradition that runs deep in Norwegian history and society. Like the Vikings of old who met at the "Things (assemblies)", join us at Viking Hall for the monthly lodge "Thing."
